A design to build from outside the home, behind the present reception desk, has met with the Board's approval. The estimated cost would be between \$600,000 and \$700,000. Bequests from families and friends are placed in a special account for capital needs. Remembrances and contributions to this project are most gratefully received as we plan for the future of this precious home.




This was a very popular program. More and more ladies attended each week. It was interesting to see the sparkle in their eyes as they were listening, laughing and participating in the activities.
